Directions

NNMC lies on the Maryland side of the Capital Beltway (I-495) in Montgomery County. The Beltway is accessed from the north on Interstate 95 or the Baltimore-Washington Parkway, from the east on MD Rt. 50, from southern MD on MD Rt. 4 or 5, from all points south on Interstate 95, and from the west on Interstate 66. Head west on the Capital Beltway. Take Exit 34, Rt. 355, South, Wisconsin Ave. towards Bethesda, in left lane. Cross Cedar Lane; at first median crossing (no light), turn left into the National Naval Medical Center. At the guard station, show ID. Park in the America Garage. After walking across from the America garage to the America building entrance walk past the information desk and take the bank of elevators on the right to the 4th floor. Turn right out of the elevator and walk past the pediatrics waiting room to the Canyon conference room on the left.


Ship Modeling Seminars

HOUSTON FOOD BANK CONFERENCE CENTER, HOUSTON, TEXAS FEATURING SPECIAL BEGINNER/INTERMEDIATE WORKSHOPS

This edition of our popular educational event should more accurately be called a Workshop rather than a Seminar. In response to your requests we have put together a set of hands-on practical sessions where you can try out the techniques that you will hear about during the classroom presentations. You also said that there were not enough topics for the beginner/journeyman modeler, and we have done our best to meet that need.

As of this writing the program is planned to include popular author Kurt Van Dahm, who will explain how you can end up with a museum quality model even if you start from a less than perfect kit. He is also an expert on the airbrush, and will bring in his equipment and let you play with it. Chairman Dan Pariser will reveal some of the mysteries of rigging, and then you can practice his tips for serving a line, stropping a block, and tying a clove hitch into a ratline. Other talks may cover the planking of a hull, with a hands-on demonstration of spiling, that most baffling of techniques. The final schedule will be circulated through the Guild's email system and to the clubs as we get closer to the date.


Cabin Fever Expo




KNOTS THAT MAKE A QUALATIVE DIFFERENCE




With very few exceptions, all the basic knots needed are the square knot, clove hitch, half hitch, figure eight, round turn, and bowline. The following crude drawings show how to tie each of these knots.











Each of these knots has multiple uses, but some of the more common uses are as follows:

- Square knot Is used to secure the ends of a rope, such as after taking multiple turns around a spar (seizing), securing the two ends.
- Two half hitches provide a quick way to form a loop, although not as secure as a bowline.
- Figure eight knot Is used to form a "stopper," as in the end of a line in a deadeye, or to prevent a line from running through a block.
- Clove hitches are used to tie something to a round or rectangular object, such as to a yard, or as the beginning of a seizing. Bowlines are the most secure form of loop knots, and are often used to secure an anchor.

Things to keep in mind:

- Use black thread if the line is to be used as part of standing rigging, white or tan if it is to be used as part of the running rigging.
- If you draw the thread through a block of beeswax, it makes the thread tacky and often makes it easier to handle, especially when seizing a line.
- Mix diluted (50%) white glue (like Elmer's) and place a drop on each knot to set it and allow to dry. **DON'T USE CA GLUE FOR THIS PURPOSE**.
- To thread the limp end of a line through a block, deadeye, etc., put CA glue on the end of the line, allow to dry, and cut off at an acute angle to form a needle sharp end. After the line is threaded, cut off the end having the CA glue.
